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ELARD supports the European Parliament's approach to strengthening LEADER and CLLD within the 2028–2034 framework. In particular, ELARD calls for:

1. Adequate and ring-fenced funding: at least 5% of rural-development resources for LEADER, while safeguarding an overall funding level comparable to the current period.
2. CLLD as a required component of territorial programming, with dedicated resources rather than merely optional use by Member States.
3. LEADER available across rural territories, not restricted to areas with specific disadvantages.
4. Multipolicy local development strategies, allowing LAGs to combine CAP, Cohesion and Fisheries policies and other relevant resources through one coherent strategy and simplified implementation framework.
5. Full LAG competences, safeguarding genuine local decision-making rather than reducing LAGs to administrative intermediaries.
6. A clear distinction between rural spending and community-led rural development: the proposed 10% rural Cohesion Policy funding allocation is welcome, but part of it should be specifically channelled through CLLD.

The solution proposed by the Council and Parliament in Articles 76 and 75, read together, clearly demonstrates that LEADER is part of CLLD. We propose combining the Council's proposals (point 3) and the Parliament's (point 1) because the LAG's competences, as indicated in point 3 (ca) of the Council's proposal, is crucial for implementing Local Development Strategies (LDS). The solution proposed by the Parliament in point 1, however, allows for the creation of urban LAGs. ELARD therefore considers that CLLD should be mandatory in all Member States and should be implemented through Local Action Groups, as it is already the case in some MSs. CLLD should not remain merely an optional territorial instrument within the National and Regional Partnership Plans. This is not consistent with the fact that about 90% of people who live in rural areas are not farmers. Indeed, when thinking about encouraging people to stay and live in rural areas, opportunities should be created for them to work and start their own businesses. During the period 2014-2020 Polish LAGs for example provided such support which helped to create about 22 000 jobs in rural areas mostly for youth and women. Therefore, the solution proposed by the Commission and Council is the most suitable for LAGs.

LEADER should not be limited to rural areas identified as having specific disadvantages, as this would risk reducing it to a compensatory instrument rather than preserving its role as a bottom-up, place-based territorial development instrument available to rural communities.
